THE UPPER ROOMS

How Can I Serve|Serving within the Church Body Scripture shows us that serving isn't something extra in the Christian life—it's central to it. Jesus Himself said, "For even the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve" (Mark 10:45). If the Savior served, then His people are called to follow that example.

1. We Are Gifted to Serve Others - The Bible teaches that every believer has been given spiritual gifts. These are God-given abilities meant to build up the church. Peter writes, "As each has received a gift, use it to serve one another" (1 Peter 4:10). In other words, God didn't give us gifts to keep for ourselves—He gave them so we could bless others.

Paul says it this way: "To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good" (1 Corinthians 12:7, ESV). When we use our gifts—whether teaching, encouraging, serving, helping, leading, or showing mercy—we help the church grow stronger.

- **2. Every Member Matters -** The church is described as a body, and every part plays an important role (Ephesians 4:16). When we serve, we contribute to the health and unity of the whole church. Serving isn't just for a few people—it's for every believer.
- **3. A Joyful Privilege -** Not all acts of service are visible, but all of them matter. Whether you're welcoming guests, helping with children, praying for others, or meeting needs behind the scenes, you are building up the body of Christ.

Listen to some of the experts....

- Norman Geisler reminds us that "spiritual gifts are a trust from God. We honor Him when we put them to use."
- **Gregory Boyd** points out that "the church looks most like Jesus when it serves with humility."
- Jared C. Wilson writes that "real service flows from the gospel. When we remember what Christ has done for us, we serve with joy rather than obligation."

May we each seek to use our gifts faithfully, loving and serving one another for God's glory and the good of His church. And if you are interested in serving in the Children, Youth, or College & Young Adult ministries please reach out to me as there are plenty of opportunities!



FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

For my reflection this week, I want to continue our theme of "Thanksgiving." Consider what Dr. Stephen Nichols, President of Reformation Bible College wrote on the topic of "What is Thanksgiving Day?"

Thanksgiving is a holiday that stretches back to a time long before America became a nation. The Pilgrims landed in 1620. They faced brutal conditions and were woefully unprepared. Roughly half of them died the first year. Then they had a successful harvest of corn. In November of 1621 they decided to celebrate a feast of thanksgiving. Edward Winslow was among those who ate that first thanksgiving meal in 1621. He noted: "Our harvest being gotten in, our governor sent four men on fowling, that so we might after a special manner rejoice together after we gathered the fruit of our labors. ...And although it be not always so plentiful as it was at this time with us, yet by the goodness of God, we are so far from want."

In addition to the fowl eaten that first Thanksgiving, the Indians also brought along five deer as their contribution to the feast. Presumably they also ate corn. Over the centuries, Americans continued to celebrate feasts of thanksgiving in the fall. Some presidents issued proclamations. Abraham Lincoln issued a proclamation for a perpetual national holiday set aside for thanksgiving. In 1863, with the nation torn apart by the Civil War, he declared: "I do therefore invite my fellow citizens in every part of the United States, and also those who are at sea and those who are sojourning in foreign lands, to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November next, as a day of Thanksgiving and Praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the Heavens."

So we have a holiday of thanksgiving born in and further nurtured during times of great adversity and struggle. We might think that times of adversity and challenge would spawn ingratitude, while times of prosperity would spawn gratitude. Sadly, the reverse is true.

We should not be counted among those who see the fourth Thursday in November as nothing more than a day of football and over-indulgence. We should be thankful for one day, set apart to consider all that we have and realize that all that we have has been given to us. Of course, such gratitude should in no wise be limited to one day out of 365.
